4. AGENCY AND STAFF REPORTS

- A. Mr. Dave Griffin, Port Operations Manager
 - 1. Bryan Scorseby's service award postponed to meeting in December, Mayor DeVries excuses herself.
 - 2. Public Open House Update around 150 people attended it was a positive event. Will try to do two open houses per year.
 - 3. Business Development Update: Speaking with a variety of different companies trying to find a way to do business at the port. Anything from alternative energy, sustainable aviation fuel, mineral processing.
 - We received an application and adjudicated a permit to Nova Minerals recently for Antimony processing for a 42-acre parcel.

We also received an application from Crowley Fuels for a fuel tank farm in the ballpark of

twenty million gallons. Still in adjudication process. They are working with an engineering firm on design and location.

We had a presentation by Terra Energy at last meeting. That project pertains to Flatlands Coal claim that is out West Susitna. Director Griffin elaborates on Terra Energy project.

Ambler road decision has fueled discussions with AIDEA. If that project moves forward Port

MacKenzie is high on the list of ports for moving goods and materials. This and other projects have created the need to finish the Port MacKenzie Rail Extension.

We signed a negotiation agreement with HIF Global; they are online today. That is Keith Meyer and will give presentation.

4. Grants updates: We received the US Department of Transportation Better Utilizing Investment to Leverage Developments Program (BUILD) \$7.8 million to build the barge ramp. We are currently in the early stages of grant negotiations. Director explains processes to get to construction phase.

FEMA Port Security Grant Award Update. \$945,00 including the match. With those funds we will swap out the 1000w ballast and metal allied high mast lights and convert to LED, we will also put shore power and water out to the deep draft dock, electrify the upper gate and get floodlight, camera, and badging system up there. We will also construct secure laydown area and upgrade signage.

Crane has been purchased from 2023 USMHP grant award should arrive by end of the year. We have three grant applications out right now. One is the Rural Tribal Assistance (RTA) planning grant out which does not require a match. We also have Port Infrastructure Development Grant (PIDP) out seeking seven million dollars, six million for replacement to cell 1 and one million for a dry cargo handling building on the dock. Then the state DOT also submitted a grant application for Port MacKenzie to expand and enhance freight infrastructure in the port district. Director Griffin expands on the DOT grant application.

5. Assembly legislation includes grant updates and the rescinding of the port development permit. DISCUSSION ENSUED


Fuel Pricing Comparison Across All Ports

Comparison of salt rates across all ports with original bar graph and annotations.


Salt Pricing Comparison Across All Ports
